


## How Common Is Your Birthday?

A friend posted an interesting <u>data table</u> on my Facebook wall yesterday, which was my birthday. The data listed each day of the year with a ranking for how many babies were born in the <u>United States</u> on each date from 1973 to 1999. Some interesting trends are evident in the data. Apparently, people like to make babies around the winter holiday season because a large proportion of babies are born in September (<u>ours</u> is due Sept. 24, btw).

Sept. 16 was most common. Feb. 29\* was least common. This heatmap is an effort to visualize the trends, with darker shades representing more births:
